### **REMINDER**

**The Speed Limit in Town is 40 km/hr.**

As per Section 4(i) of Bylaw No. 4/2014 *The Traffic Bylaw*, the Speed limit in the Town of Willow Bunch is 40 km/hr. This does not apply to B Avenue (Highway 36) which is posted at 50 km/hr.

Also note that Park Street has a posted speed limit of 30 km/hr.

Although 3<sup>rd</sup> St. East is access to the 705 grid, the speed limit is 40 km/hr. Increased speed on this street has prompted council to implement the use of speed bumps. Please note this area will be enforced by radar.

These are maximum speeds, not the speed required to make your way from Point A to Point B. With summer upon us, there are a lot more pedestrians and children out on the streets.

# Single Stream Curbside Recycling Reminders



## ALLOWABLE MATERIALS

- Flattened corrugated cardboard and paperboard (empty cereal boxes, empty tissue boxes)
  - ◊ Newspaper, flyers, inserts, junk mail and envelopes
  - ◊ Magazines, catalogues, telephone books, paperback books
  - ◊ Brown paper bags, tissue roll cores, gift and packing paper, paper egg cartons
    - ◊ Copier paper, NCR (no carbon required) paper
      - ◊ Soft Drink and beer cans
      - ◊ Foil trays and pie plates
    - ◊ Household tin cans (please rinse)
      - ◊ Containers with logo 1 – 7 ♻️
- Plastic bags, plastic drink bottles and plastic wrap (please rinse)
- Juice and milk cartons, milk jugs, tetra-pak containers, pouches (please rinse)
- Glass – household bottles and jars (please rinse)

## ITEMS NOT ACCEPTED

- Household garbage, organics, or hazardous waste
- Waxed, plasticized or food contaminated paper, cardboard cups or plastic plates
- Soiled tissues, napkins and paper
- Confetti shredded paper
- Styrofoam or other foam packing materials
- Auto parts or batteries

## NOTES:

- \* Shredded paper must be bagged in CLEAR plastic bags
- \* Please flatten ALL cardboard boxes
- \* Do Not bag or tie your recyclables
- \* Please – No Garbage
- \* Place cart roadside by 7 am on collection day
- \* Don't pack material too tightly



## Coronach RCMP Monthly Stats Report

## RCMP REPORT



Along with our regular traffic enforcement duties, the RCMP and SGI are partnering each month of the year to concentrate extra focus on one area of traffic safety for enforcement purposes. The month of JULY will see us place extra focus on work zones.

Drivers must slow to 60 km/hr in work zones whether workers are present or not. There may be hazards present such as loose gravel or uneven pavement that

**makes the area dangerous. The majority of work zones are 3 – 5 km in length. Signage for work zones should follow a general pattern:**

**An orange sign saying “workers present”**

**A black and white sign saying 60km/hr (at this point you are legally required to slow to 60 km/hr)**

**There may be signs / workers indicating you need to slow further or stop completely**

**An “End of Work Area” signals the end of the work zone, it will be followed a black and white sign indicating the regular speed limit**

**The base fine for speeding in a work zone is \$240 and increases by \$6 for every kilometre you are over the speed limit up to 90 km/hr; and \$12 per kilometre you are 90 km/hr. For example, in a 60 km/hr work zone the following would be the fines:**

**70 km/hr will cost you \$360**

**80 km/hr will cost you \$440**

**90 km/hr will cost you \$500**

**100 km/hr will cost you \$1008**

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## **LIBRARY**

Saskatchewan will be moving into Stage 4.2 of its Re-Open Saskatchewan on Monday, June 29. It is during this phase that public libraries will be permitted to reopen in a limited fashion, while still following provincial guidelines around social distancing. We look forward to welcoming patrons back into the library, **but we will not be ready to reopen on June 29<sup>th</sup>.**

Employees are actively working on everything needed to move into this next step of the plan and, we are

doing everything possible to help ensure the health and safety of our employees and patrons.

As we begin to reopen libraries, things will be different. There will be limited hours and public health protocols in each branch, including limited capacity and can vary from 2 to 30 patrons. As per government reopening regulations, all patrons must either practice Hand Washing or use the sanitizing stations, and practice physical distancing protocols. All library materials must be quarantined for 72 hours before being made available to the public/next person on the hold list. More details about targeted reopening dates will be available in the coming weeks.

MOOSE JAW/PALLISER continues to provide public library service in the following ways:

- \* Library employees are available to answer questions and provide support over chat, email and phone, during local branch hours
- \* MOOSE JAW/PALLISER will continue to **offer holds pick-up services by appointment** at all locations
- \* Effective June 29<sup>th</sup>, intra-agency holds will be available online through the Catalogue. There will be delays to the new Covid-19 procedures. Holds will start to be delivered between regions the week of July 6<sup>th</sup>
- \* Book returns are open
- \* Late fines are suspended. **ALL BOOKS BORROWED PRIOR TO MARCH 16<sup>TH</sup> ARE DUE BY JULY 15<sup>TH</sup>.**
- \* Digital materials – including eBooks, eAudiobooks, music, movies and more – are available online through Hoopla, Library-2-Go/Overdrive/Libby, TumbleBooks, Press Reader, Chilton Automotive Repair, Creative Bug
- \* Summer reading and literacy (TumbleBooks) activities online through the Moose Jaw website or the Digital Academy on the Palliser website
- \* We are offering online programming an online basic computer courses

In addition to preparing for the next step in our reopening plan, we are very busy working to meet the current demand for library services. In the first week of offering holds pick-up services, 1,896 holds were placed by Palliser residents and 2,293 books checked out. There are also over 14,349 items yet to be returned.

## Insurance Corner

### **Did you know about:**

#### **Replacement Cost vs Actual Cash Value**

- **Replacement Cost** means, at the time of loss, destruction or damage, of repairing or replacing (whichever is the lesser) with like and quality, without deduction or depreciation.

- **Actual Cash Value** means the cost to replace or repair your property considering depreciation which includes such things as its age, condition, resale value, obsolescence and normal life expectancy at the time of loss. Actual Cash Value is normally lower than the cost to replace your property at today's price.

#### **How is this determined:**

There are multiple factors that decide whether your property/belongings qualify for Replacement Cost or Actual Cash Value. To name a few:

- The age of the item at the time of purchase
- The condition of the property at the time the policy was written
- Full details on the property/belongings to help better determine the qualifications, etc.

#### **Tips:**

If your property/belongings state Actual Cash Value on your policy talk to your broker as your qualifications can change. For example: if you completely renovate the siding and roof on your Outbuilding you may be eligible for Replacement Cost. We strongly encourage you to provide your Broker with photos whenever possible to ensure your coverage meets your needs.

# WILLOW BUNCH MUSEUM

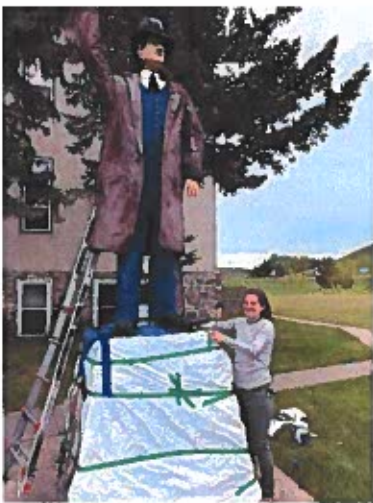

**Introduction**

Saskatchewan Ministry of Environment requires that at least once each year waterworks owners provide notification to consumers of the quality of water produced and supplied as well as information on the performance of the waterworks in submitting samples as required by a Minister's Order or Permit to Operate a waterworks. The following is a summary of the Town of Willow Bunch water quality and sample submission compliance record for the 2019 time period. This report was completed on June, 2020. Readers should refer to Environment's Municipal Drinking Water Quality Monitoring Guidelines, June 2015, EPB 502 for more information on minimum sample submission requirements and the meaning of type of sample. Permit requirements for a specific waterworks may require more sampling than outlined in the department's monitoring guidelines. *A minimum of 0.1 milligrams per litre (mg/L) free chlorine residual is required for water entering the distribution system. Tests are normally performed on a daily basis by the waterworks operator and are to be recorded in operation records. This data includes the number of free chlorine residual tests performed, the overall range of free chlorine residual (highest and lowest recorded values) and the number of tests and percentage of results not meeting the minimum requirement of 0.1 mg/L free chlorine residual.*

**Chemical – Health Category**

All waterworks serving less than 5000 persons are required to submit water samples for SE's Chemical Health category once every 2 years. The Chemical Health category includes analysis for arsenic, barium, boron, cadmium, chromium, fluoride, lead, nitrate, selenium and uranium.

The last sample for Chemical Health analysis was submitted June 2020. Sample results indicated that the provincial drinking water quality standards were not exceeded.

All waterworks serving less than 5000 persons are required to submit water samples for SE's General Chemical category once every two years if a ground water source and once per three months every second year if a surface water or blended surface/groundwater source. The General Chemical category includes analysis for alkalinity, bicarbonate, calcium, carbonate, chloride, conductivity, hardness (as CaCO<sub>3</sub>), magnesium, sodium, sulphate and total dissolved solids.

The last sample for General Chemical analysis was required on (2020) and submitted June 2020. Samples exceeded provincial aesthetic objectives for the General Chemical category for the following parameters: ALKALINITY, CONDUCTIVITY, SODIUM, SULPHATE, TOTAL DISSOLVED SOLIDS

\*Objectives apply to certain characteristics of or substances found in water for human consumptive or hygienic use. The presence of these substances will affect the acceptance of water by consumers and/or interfere with the practice of supplying good quality water. Compliance with drinking water aesthetic objectives is not mandatory as these objectives are in the range where they do not constitute a health hazard. The aesthetic objectives for several parameters (including hardness as CaCO<sub>3</sub>, magnesium, sodium and total dissolved solids) consider regional differences in drinking water sources and quality.
